CONCLUSIONS OF THE INFORMAL MEETING OF THE BSEC WORKING GROUP ON CUSTOMS MATTERS

BSEC Headquarters, 20 September 2017

- 1. The Informal Meeting of the BSEC Working Group on Customs Matters was held at the BSEC Headquarters on 20 September 2017.

8. The Meeting was co-chaired by Mr. Sergii KRAVCHENKO, Consul in charge of BSEC, Consulate General of Ukraine in Istanbul, and Mrs. Didem DİRLİK SONGÜR, Head of Department for Multilateral Relations, Ministry of Customs and Trade of the Republic of Turkey.

AGENDA ITEM 1: ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA

9. The Draft Agenda of the Meeting was discussed and adopted. The Agenda, as adopted, is attached as **Annex II**.

AGENDA ITEM 2: STATUS OF IMPLEMENTATION OF RESOLUTIONS, DECISIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COUNCIL OF MINISTERS OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS RELATED TO CUSTOMS MATTERS AND FOLLOW-UP OF THE DECLARATIONS ADOPTED BY THE HEADS OF CUSTOMS ADMINISTRATIONS OF THE BSEC MEMBER STATES

- 10. The BSEC PERMIS informed the participants on the state of implementation of the Resolutions, Decisions and Recommendations of the BSEC Council and of the Declarations adopted by the Heads of Customs Administrations of the BSEC Member States.
- 11. The participants of the Meeting exchanged views on the issue and agreed that there was no need to discuss updating the list of representatives to the Working Group on a long term basis during the meetings of the Working Group. Instead, it was agreed that the BSEC PERMIS, in consultation with the Country-Coordinator will update the list before each Meeting of the Working Group. The current list of representatives of the Member States to the Working Group on Customs Matters is attached as <u>Annex III</u>.

AGENDA ITEM 3: HARMONIZATION AND SIMPLIFICATION OF CUSTOMS PROCEDURES

- 12. The Delegation of the Republic of Turkey informed on recent measures taken at national level for the harmonization and simplification of customs procedures. It was emphasized that the Customs Authorities of the Republic of Turkey are modernizing their tools and technology focusing on developing IT systems.
- 13. The representative of Turkey, in his presentation, provided detailed information on e-TIR Pilot Projects with Iran and Georgia on Customs to Business/Business to Customs (C2B2C) e-data exchange and Customs to Customs (C2C) data exchange, as well as on Single Window system in Turkey, launched on 26 January 2017, on works done so far in accordance with the requirements of the WTO TFA, which entered into force on 22 February 2017, and on Compulsory Pre-Declaration Submission (TIRCUS), the implementation of which has become compulsory as of April 2017.
- 14. The participants took note of the information provided by BSEC PERMIS that so far only three BSEC Member States provided the links of their websites with available information to be used for elaboration of the draft "Manual on import, export and transit procedures in the BSEC Member States" and invited the interested Member States to provide the necessary information as soon as possible.

- 15. The participants invited the BSEC PERMIS, in cooperation with the Country-Coordinator, to elaborate the above mentioned draft *Manual* based on information provided by the BSEC Member States and submit it for consideration to the next Meeting of the Working Group.
- 16. The representatives of the BSEC-URTA touched upon the obstacles existing in the Region and elaborated on the possible ways out from this situation. In this respect, information also was provided on *IRU-BSEC-URTA-TOBB Seminar on Computerization of TIR Procedures and other Road Transport Related Documents* (Istanbul, 15 June 2017) and on 18th International Conference *International Road Transport: Problems, Solutions, Prospects* (Odessa, 6-7 September 2017), outcome documents of which are attached as **Annexes IV and V**.
- 17. A presentation was made by the representative of the IRU, Mr. Raphael HIRT, Head eTIR, on Digitalisation of TIR procedures, concerning the initiatives taken at various levels to modernize the TIR Convention through digitalisation of its procedures. During the presentation the representative of the IRU confirmed the IRU's continuous support to the modernisation of the TIR procedure, through: Signing of a long term cooperation agreement with UNECE targeting the full digitalisation of the TIR procedure; Announcement at next session of the UNECE Working Party on Customs Questions affecting Transport (WP.30) that the IRU will propose to finance the cost of the establishment at UNECE of the Customs to Customs data exchange platform, the so-called eTIR international system, within a balanced Private-Public partnership; and Continued support to Customs Authorities to implement data exchange mechanisms between Customs, Transport operators and IRU. The presentation is attached as **Annex VI**.
- 18. The participants invited the Customs Administrations of the BSEC Member States to continue to share their experience in harmonization and simplification of customs procedures at the next meetings of the Working Group.

AGENDA ITEM 4: EXCHANGING EXPERIENCE ON METHODOLOGY OF TIME RELEASE STUDY

- 19. The delegation of the Republic of Turkey informed the participants on the latest developments on the issue which took place in Turkey.
- 20. The participants agreed to the usefulness of exchange of information.

AGENDA ITEM 5: STRATEGIES AND POLICIES OF THE BSEC MEMBER STATES IN ENHANCING INTEGRITY OF OFFICIALS OF CUSTOMS ADMINISTRATIONS IN THE BSEC REGION

21. The initiative to coordinate with neighbours as well as to consider the establishment of a network between neighbouring countries in the BSEC Region to combat the phenomena was put forward by the BSEC PERMIS and the BSEC Member States were invited to consider this issue at the forthcoming meetings of the Working Group.

CONCLUSIONS OF THE IRU-BSEC-URTA-BSEC-TOBS SEMINAR ON COMPUTERIZATION OF TIR PROCEDURES AND OTHER ROAD TRANSPORT RELATED DOCUMENTS

The Seminar on "Computerization of TIR Procedures and Other Transport Related Documents" was held in Istanbul, Republic of Turkey, on 15 June 2017. It was jointly organized by the Union of Road Transport Associations in the Black Sea Economic Cooperation Region (BSEC-URTA), the International Road Transport Union (IRU), the Permanent International Secretariat of the Organization of the Black Sea Economic Cooperation (BSEC PERMIS) and the Union of Chambers and Commodity Exchanges of Turkey (TOBB).

Welcoming statements were delivered by Ms. Aslı Gözütok, President of the Union of Road Transport Associations in the Black Sea Economic Cooperation Region (BSEC-URTA) and Ambassador Traian Chebeleu, Deputy Secretary General of BSEC PERMIS

BSEC-URTA President, Ms. Aslı Gözütok welcomed the participants and emphasized the role of the BSEC-URTA over the years in promoting the development of road transport in the BSEC Member States, with special reference to the Memorandum of Understanding on the Facilitation of Road Transport of Goods in the BSEC Region, with its main objectives to gradually liberalize the road goods transport market, simplify and harmonize custom procedures and documents, simplify and facilitate visa procedures for professional drivers.

Ms. Gözütok expressed that entry into force of the WTO TFA on 22 February 2017 launches a new phase for trade facilitation reforms all-over the world and create a significant boost for commerce and the multilateral trading system as a whole, This is also a momentum for both private and public sectors in the BSEC Member States to reinforce their cooperation and intensify efforts to implement the objectives of the MoU on the Facilitation of Road Transport of Goods in the BSEC Region.

Ambassador Traian Chebeleu in his opening statement, focused on Significance of this Seminar as one more step in implementing the *BSEC Economic Agenda: Towards an Enhanced BSEC Partnership*, which sets the "Cooperation among the Customs and Border Crossing Administrations" and "Intensifying intra-regional trade and investments" among the seventeen goals in the priority areas of action of the Organization. He recalled the several initiatives undertaken by BSEC in cooperation with other international organizations aiming at implementing these goals, among which special reference was made to the OSCE-BSEC Workshop on Best Practices at Border Crossing, in 2013, and the Joint UNECE-BSEC Regional Seminar on Trade Facilitation and Single Window, in 2014.

The Seminar was attended by participants from the following IRU and BSEC-URTA Member Associations, Observers and Guests: ANALTIR(AL), ABADA(AZ), AEBTRI(BG), GIRCA(GE), OFAE(GR), AITA(MD), UNTRR(RO), AMERIT(FYROM), UND(TR), TOBB(TR), LVS(LT), ROSGOSSTRAKH(RU), BRASS(BG), AULT, BSEC and IRU.

A presentation was made by Mr.Evgeny Kokiy, Project Manager of BSEC PERMIS which pointed the main provision of the WTO Trade Facilitation Agreement and how will the TFA streamline customs procedures. It was underscored that the full implementation of the TFA will reduce trade costs by 14.3% and by an even bigger percentage for developed countries. The important role of other international agreements and projects in Trade Facilitation was mentioned: WTO Trade Facilitation Agreement Facility (TFAF); the Revised Kyoto Convention; the TIR Convention; the International Convention on the Harmonization of Frontier Controls of Goods; the International Convention on the Containers; the International Convention on the Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System; the Convention on Temporary Admission (Istanbul Convention); the BSEC Permit System; Monitoring the border waiting; BSEC Pilot Project for Introduction of the IVWC in the BSEC Region.

Mr. Koziy mentioned Transit related Global Arrangements as a Trade Facilitation Instrument, highlighting the TIR system as an important facilitation tool for international trade and transport, based on the TIR Convention, 1975, having today 70 contracting parties, and UNECE activities aimed at the computerization of the TIR Procedure and the eTIR pilot projects initiated: Georgia-Turkey and Iran-Turkey. The role of the International Convention on the Harmonization of Frontier Controls of Goods, 1982, with 58 contracting parties today, in facilitating cross border transport of goods through nationally coordinated, internationally harmonized, shorter, reduced formalities and controls of goods at borders was also underlined.

Mr. Raphaël HIRT, Head of eTIR (IRU) made a presentation on Automation of TIR Procedures and Electronic Exchange of Data.. The advantages of the TIR Holder Portal, with 32 connected countries, were also presented. The TIR-EPD Usage was discussed offering details of the eTIR Pilot Project implemented by Turkey-Iran (first phase November 2015-August 2016 and second phase August 2016-February 2017) and its results with a special emphasis on the security of the procedure. This e-TIR Pilot Project enabled IRU to take the opportunity to develop additional facilities for the transport industry such as distance payment of the guarantees, for intermodal transport and the sub-contractors. Also, transport industry sees prospective in the frame of TIR computerization.

The joint UNECE-IRU Turkey-Iran Pilot project report was recently published by UNECE. It concludes in particular that:

UNECE-IRU eTIR pilot project: Iran – Turkey was a success from multiple perspectives

Project demonstrates that the full computerisation of TIR is feasible and that
procedures implemented in this pilot could serve as a basis for similar projects in any
TIR Contracting Party wishing to make progress towards the full computerisation of TIR

Iran and Turkey, and by extension any other TIR Contracting Party, are strongly encouraged to join or launch new projects to make further progress in the full

computerisation of TIR

 In light of the first 64 successful eTIR transports, and pending signature of a new IRU-UNECE MoU to ensure the sustainability of the the to ensure eTIR international system allowing further developments, stakeholders in Iran and Turkey are encouraged to continue eTIR transports between both countries, involving more transport operators and additional customs offices

He also mentioned that a new MoU was just signed between UNECE and IRU aiming at full computerisation of the TIR procedure. Further Pilot Projects will be carried out under this frame, including all countries willing to join.

Mr. Mehmet Ali Oran, EU Expert at the Ministry of Customs and Trade of the Republic of Turkey, presented the Turkish Experience and Projections in Use for the Digitalization of Transit Systems. The position of Turkey as a transit country due to its geographical location and as one of the biggest beneficiary country of the transit systems was highlighted. The Transit Systems in Turkey were explained, with emphasis on why Digitalization is crucial.

After a comparison between the TIR System and the Common Transit System, the future of the TIR System and Turkey's approach were discussed, anticipating the future of Transit: e-transactions, a paperless environment and Digital Customs. Special focus was given to C2B2C and C2C data exchange within the scope of eTIR pilot projects that are being conducted by Turkey-Iran and Turkey-Georgia. Potential advantages and future prospects for adding this transit scheme to the WCO Globally Networked Customs (GNC) as a Utility Block was highlighted.

Mr. Ahmet KARAKAŞ (Expert at TOBB) focused on the Transit Facilitation from the perspective of the Private Sector. The following points were highlighted: TOBB's activities and services are fully in line with the requirements of the WTO Trade Facilitation Agreement; TOBB is carrying out the duties of guaranteeing and distribution of documents/permits and, on the other side, is following the other international agreements and is actively present in the international organisations; TOBB is represented in the Trade Facilitation Board established in Turkey where it defends the interests of Turkish Private Sector and provide its feedbacks for simplification, standardisation, harmonization and transparency. Information was also presented on Automation Systems used and developed by TOBB within the concept of Trade Facilitation.

Mr. Zeljko Jeftic, IRU Global Head Innovation made a presentation on "eCMR and related Pilot Projects". The existing IT tools were mentioned, especially the Additional Protocol to the Convention on the Contract for the International Carriage of Goods by Roads (eCMR Protocol 2008) concerning the Electronic Consignment Note, which entered into force on 5 June 2011 and is currently ratified by 11 States. The presentation estimated that the market demand for eCMR is real, as its implementation brings considerable benefits for all actors involved in financial terms and in transparency and traceability terms. Furthermore, eCMR brings increased economic competitiveness of countries and parties involved and also increases road safety

Ms. Natalia Polunina, Director of Transport Insurance Department, Rosgosstrakh Russian Federation made apresentation on the "Impact of usage of eCMR instead of paper CMR from the perspective of an Insurer"

Conclusions

Participants to the Seminar:

- Noted the progress made by Turkey in line with the success of the ongoing eTIR pilot projects with Iran and Georgia and expressed their hope that similar Pilot projects will be soon extended to Ukraine, Moldova, Azerbaijan and any country willing to join.
- Called on BSEC PERMIS to conduct a joint session of the Working Group on Customs Matters and BSEC-URTA Member Associations with a view to considering implementation of the e-TIR in the BSEC region.
- Stressed the importance of the implementation of the Memorandum of Understanding on the Facilitation of the Road Transport of Goods in the BSEC Region as a priority, which also contains special provisions for facilitation of customs procedures at the borders of the BSEC Member States.
- Welcomed the elaboration of the Regional Trade Facilitation Strategy for the BSEC Region, in collaboration with the BSEC Working Groups on Custom Matters and on Trade and Economic Development,

Recommendations

Participants to the Seminar made the following recommendations:

- BSEC should consider setting-up a Task Force under the joint coordination of the Working Groups on Customs Matters, on Trade and Economic Development and on Transport with participation of BSEC-URTA having as main task a coordinated implementation of the BSEC Strategy Paper on Trade Facilitation under a specific and timeframe Action Plan.
- The BSEC Member States are encouraged to allow the industry to go digital by ratifying the Additional e-CMR Protocol.
- The BSEC Member States are encouraged to join the ongoing projects aiming at Computerization of TIR procedures, based on the successful conclusions of the Iran-Turkey Pilot project, and on the new MoU signed between UNECE and IRU.
- Necessary synergies should be considered by the BSEC Member States to conduct the pilot projects related to the computerization of TIR procedures.
- UNECE and Contracting Parties to the TIR Convention should intensify their efforts for further facilitation under this Convention.
- Encouraged all the stakeholders to take tangible measures to implement the e-data exchange mechanism with the neighbouring states and potential regional partners for a more comprehensive risk analysis method and expeditious transport, to enhance the trade facilitation.
- BSEC working groups related to customs matters, to trade facilitation and road transport to jointly work for implementation of the provisions of the Memorandum of Understanding on the Facilitation of the Road Transport of Goods in the BSEC Region.





RESOLUTION of the 18th International Conference "International Road Transport: Problems, Solutions, Prospects"

We the delegates of the 18th International Conference "International Road Transport: Problems, Solutions, Prospects", held on 6-7 September 2017 in Odessa, Ukraine,

fully aware of the fundamental changes in transport and logistics sectors in the context of the growing fourth industrial revolution, achieving 2030 Sustainable Development Goals (SDG), outcomes of the Global Conference on Sustainable Transport, convened by the Secretary-General of the United Nations on 26-27 November 2016 in Ashgabat, Turkmenistan, and of the Ministerial Resolution on "Embracing the new era for sustainable inland transport and mobility", adopted at the 79th session of the UNECE Inland Transport Committee (21 February 2017);

stressing an important role of the road transport in achieving SDGs, promoting sustainable transport and cargo mobility, as well as effective and reliable trade and transport links;

welcoming the entry into force of the Trade Facilitation Agreement in February 2017, geographical expansion of key UN international agreements and conventions, facilitating trade, transport and transit, namely, the Customs Convention on the International Transport of Goods under Cover of TIR Carnets (TIR Convention, 1975), with recent accession of Pakistan, China, India and others:

committed to the implementation of the UN Resolution 70/197, Towards comprehensive cooperation among all modes of transport for promoting sustainable multimodal transit corridors (on 22 December 2015), through gradual development of interregional transport links between Western, Central and Eastern Europe, the Black Sea region, the Middle East and the Asia-Pacific area, in particular the transport corridors of Europe-Caucasus-Asia (TRACECA), and the GUAM Organisation for Democracy and Economic Development, connecting with the Trans-European transport network (TEN-T);

promoting the full use of Information Communication Technologies in international road transport, with particular emphasis on the computerisation of procedures, established under the UN agreements and conventions, namely, the implementation of e-CMR, the digital consignment note, and eTIR, the new generation of the global customs transit system;

emphasising the creation of favourable conditions for fleets renewal that meet high ecological standards and safety requirements, thus contributing to the implementation of the Paris Agreement on Climate Change, as well as the UN Resolution 70/260, Improving global road safety (on 15 April 2016);

taking into account the need for the ongoing harmonisation of criteria and requirements referred to by international road transport operators when accessing the market of transport services, as well as increasing the scope of multilateral permit systems;


fully supporting the consistency in building professional excellence of drivers and managers in road transport companies,

hereby address national governments, international organisations and all stakeholders concerned by the development of sustainable road transport, and recommend to

- further update national legislation to comply with the international provisions and standards contained in UN conventions and agreements, as well as in the Trade Facilitation Agreement, providing seamless cross-border transport and transit;
- implement and promote the use of technological innovations in road transport, in particular by encouraging the transition to the digitalisation of transport documents, first of all in international transport;
- apply the new ones and further promote the existing TIR tools –
 iCarnet (a guarantee for customs transit between customs authorities
 of the same country), TIR+ (increased guarantee under TIR), eTIR
 (electronic TIR procedure), engaging subcontractors under the TIR
 procedure, launching intermodal pilots under cover of TIR Carnets,
 TIR-EPD (TIR Electronic Pre-Declaration);

- take steps for signing new bilateral and multilateral agreements on international road transport with the People's Republic of China and other countries in Asia and Middle East that shall provide access for foreign transport operators to Chinese and Asian countries freight cargo, and geographical expansion of international road transport in new directions;
- join new eTIR pilots, aimed at paperless TIR and run by IRU together with the UNECE, as well as launch a fully electronic procedure on transport corridors of TRACECA and GUAM, connecting Ukraine with Turkey, Georgia, Azerbaijan and Kazakhstan;
- accede to the electronic consignment note (e-CMR) Protocol of the UN's Convention on transporting cargo by road, the CMR, and put it into practice of international road transport operations;
- amend bilateral intergovernmental agreements on international road transport, by removing transit and bilateral permits for the transport of goods, increasing the scope of multilateral permit systems;
- further promote high-quality and safe infrastructure along the international transport and transit corridors, particularly TRACECA, GUAM and the Black Sea Ring Highway corridors, connecting the Trans-European transport network (TEN-T) with the Asian Highway network;
- create conditions for fair competition and transparent access to the market of transport services, by updating national legislation to comply with the provisions provided by the Quality Charter for International Road Haulage Operations under the ECMT Multilateral Quota System;
- promote energy-efficient and innovative fleets that meet high ecological standards, using the instruments of operational and financial leasing;
- promote relevant training programmes for professional drivers aimed at reducing accident rates and the severity of injuries;
- apply IRU Academy standards recognised by the ECMT Quality Charter as a key benchmark that fully meets the requirements for professional qualifications of drivers and managers of transport companies.








Recent initiatives to digitalise the TIR procedure

- Project demonstrates that the full computerisation of TIR is feasible and that procedures implemented in this pilot could serve as a basis for similar projects in any TIR Contracting Party wishing to make progress towards the full computerisation of TIR
- Iran and Turkey, and by extension any other TIR Contracting Parties, are strongly encouraged to join or launch new projects to make further progress in the full computerisation of TIR
- In light of the first 64 successful eTIR transports, and pending signature of a new IRU-UNECE MoU to ensure the sustainability of the "lightweight" eTIR international system allowing further developments, stakeholders in Iran and Turkey are encouraged to continue eTIR transports between both countries, involving more transport operators and additional customs offices


